FAIR GO, MATE!!!!!!!

The world witnesses many injustices that make our blood boil, especially in Australia where we cherish the notion of everybody having a fair go. Last October the blood of many boomerang throwers was at boiling point at the annual Albury Boomerang Championships.

Ten throwers turned up to battle the elements. A strained diaphragm stopped me being the eleventh, but I was able to participate as an unbiased referee. The six events proved to be a bit one-sided with our new President, Bruce Carter, really burning up the turf to win 4 of the 6 events. Not only that, but he came 2nd in one of the other two. He only bombed out in Accuracy.

FAIR GO, MATE!!!!!!! CONTINUED

At the end of the day when prizes were being handed out the real bombshell landed!! Bruce had not one the Over-All! In everyone's eyes he was clearly the best thrower on the day, but that honour was not to be his. It went to Robbie Croll, who won 2 events and picked up 2nds. Rob is a great thrower, but he wasn't the best Over-All thrower on that day. So what went wrong? The system!

When the USA came here in 1981 for our first International Competition we had to work out a system of points for the various placings. It was decided then to reverse the placings, so that if you had 20 throwers then first got 20, 2nd 19, 3rd 18 and so on till 20th got 1. There were no bonus points for coming in the first three place positions that we usually honour with some trophies. That is the system that we have taken on board for getting the Over-All Champion. I think the ALBURY INCIDENT proves there is a weakness in it.

So, what are the alternatives we should be looking at?

In some sporting bodies where they have five or six events or more they drop the contestants worst effort for the day. In others they drop the BEST and WORST effort.

I would like to propose another one where you could still count every event (if you wished), but where you reward the people who achieve the top three places. I would like to see bonus points of 4 for first, 3 for 2nd, and 2 for third. How would this work? If we had 24 throwers as the base for our marks then they would go as follows:

1st	30	8th	17
2nd	26	9th	16
3rd	23	10th	15
4th	21	11th	14
5th	20	12th	13
6th	19	down to	
7th	18	24th	1

I see an advantage in keeping this scoring range all the time, no matter what number of contestants is. Here we seldom get to 24 contestants. If we did then we would have to upgrade the marks. But by keeping it at this you would always be able to compare the merits of the Over-All performances with other competitions, since a first would always bring 30, a second 26, etc. At the moment you can't do that since our numbers vary so much, and the points depend on the number of contestants. With this system, if only 9 take part then the points would run from 30 to 16, 12 contestants it would go from 30 to 13, etc.

The ALBURY INCIDENT proves that something needs to be done...next time it could be Robbie who is robbed, or any thrower. We all like to see justice, so let's give this problem some thought. Talk about it, think about it, and let's see if we can get something done!

Dates.. 22nd and 23rd of August.

INTERNATIONAL CUP

Venue.. Central Park, Hamburg Germany.

Dates.. August 31st to September 5th.

Events.. Three 1 day teams competitions, One individual competition, Team Gel Competition.

Accommodation.. "Hamburg Guest House" cost approx. \$20.00 per night including breakfast.

Transportation.. Transportation to and from the field will be arranged.

Costs.. Total costs for the Cup including accommodation is approx. \$320-00 Australian.

MULTI – BLADERS....THE BEGINNING OF THE END??!

The nineties has seen the beginning of the multiblader era in boomerang throwing. Of course, multibladers have always been around for throwers to amuse themselves with and bring delight to crowds at demonstrations. The many arms are easier to see than two armed rangs. I have a magnificent six-blader made by Bunny Read that looks like a block of rotating colour in the air...people love to see it in flight.

However, competition throwers are not interested in how a boomerang looks in the air... what they want is performance... and points on the board. During the eighties we have seen some tremendous developments in boomerang design and performance. Think especially of MTA and Fast Catch, where the progress has been staggering. And now we have the official entry of three-bladers.

What is the effect of using three-bladers? I think there are several factors to consider.

First, I feel they have partially robbed boomerang throwing of one of its most cherished skills....catching. With two-bladers there was always a hole to ruin that catch, but with three-bladers there is a solid middle. No reasonable thrower should miss a catch with these. The only factor that could lead to missing a catch now is the speed of the boomerang coming in. This really only effects one competition....fast Catch. In all other comps you should not miss a catch.

Another area of skill that has diminished is Accuracy. Multi-bladers seem to have a homing device on them! I am not sure if it is because the many arms make the boomerang doing a circular flight and therefore end up back with you. Some of our aerodynamic experts can expand on this point.

Of course, both these factors should mean we will get better results and we already are. They are proving a real boom in trick catching for those who have them, especially the overseas three-bladed plastic variety which stands the wind very well.

What are we likely to lose now that multi-bladers are in?

I feel there could be a down-turn in two-armed research, especially amongst those engaged in competition throwing. That would be a great loss to the boomerang world. And now we have three-bladers, what is stopping us using 4, 5 or more blades? What is the rationale?

I am not sure the public would recognise (in their minds) a comp of multi-bladers as a boomerang comp, especially in Australia. They suggest more of a toy or trick item to our public, who really only have one image of a rang in their mind...two arms. Anything else gives them the feeling of being a bit false.

The efforts and achievements of throwers who set records prior to 1990 may be severely diminished also.

MULTI BLADERS CONTINUED.....

Consecutive Catch is a classic example. We have oohed and ashed year by year as the tally has grown and grown. Rob Croll's 653 was fantastic to watch. With three-bladers...and the time to do it...we are now looking at possibly thousands. Fast Catch is already going down. Accuracy shouldn't be long behind. In another 10 years people won't know what sort of rangs were being used and I feel the achievements of the two-armed throwers will suffer accordingly.

What does the future hold? Will there be two-arm comps and three-armed comps? How many arms will we be able to use? Who will decide? Can two-armed rangs compete with three-armed ones?

I know the three-armed decision came from overseas use. We have adopted it to stay in the race with them. Have we or they thought through this whole question enough?

Is this the end of the two-armed era and the beginning of the multi-blader era?

OBITUARY

Bill McGovern, Scotland's oldest thrower died of a heart attack on 14th August 1991, in Edinburgh. A good friend and correspondent of Br. Brian Thomas. Br. Thomas met Bill in 1985 and threw with him in front of the Queen's palace! (She was in residence at the time too.) He was a true gentleman, who only brought honour and respect to the sport. He is survived by his wife Mary and children. His grand-daughter Sharon McKenzie, wrote to Br. Thomas informing him of his death. She is also very interested in boomerangs and wants to keep up contact with Br. Thomas.

Jimmy James passed away on the 27th October 1991, from a stroke. He was a famous Black Tracker for the Police and Aboriginal of the Year. Jimmy lived with the Robert's Family and was a great inspiration for all the throwers at the 1988 BICENTENIAL WORLD TEAM CUP. His great sense of humour and easy going manner made him a pleasure to know. Jimmy will be sadly missed.

ROGER PERRY'S EUROPEAN TOUR.

My tour started with a weeks visit with Axel Heckner in Giessen, most of the week was spent making and practising for the German Championships. The 2 day competition was held in Winnenden and organised by German President Uli Konzelman.

Over 100 competitors took part in the event and it was decided that only 50 throwers would qualify to compete on the 2nd day, after seeing the high level of competition i was having my doubts as to whether I would make the cut.

Fortunately I survived the cut and finished in 19th place overall. I felt no disappointment at this as the competition was fierce, top place-getter was the likeable Oliver Rau followed by Volker Behrens.

From the competition I spent some time with Michael and Gabbi Siems in Weinheim testing the fine German wheat beers and rye bread plus a visit to the castle in Heidelberg. After Michaels it was off to the north of Germany to visit Fridolin Frost and Volker Behrens, I learnt from Fridolin the advantage of Paxolin versus wood for competition. Most of the Germans and French are now using paxolin in most events, so it was with this knowledge that I brought myself a sheet hoping to make some killer booms for the European Championships.

Unfortunately time was not there for me to make them in time as I was on my way for a 5 day stay with Gunter Moeller. All we had time for was a little practice plus visits to the older areas in Germany before heading off to the European Championships in Bad Hersfeld.

The European Championships had the top 20 German place-getters for the year and throwers from all over Europe. We all stayed at a hostel near the field and on the eve of the competition many of us decided to get a good meal, unfortunately we got lost for quite some time but in the end managed to find a restaurant, after ordering the meal the drinks arrived only to be dumped on to Torsten Fredrich lap, we had a great laugh but Torsten wasn't happy.

Torstens revenge was to come as he was in fine form on the first day of the competition only a few points away from leader Fridolin Frost. The competition really was exciting on the second day with a late surge from Swiss thrower Thomas Stehrenberger, final placegetters were Fridolin Frost, Torsten Fredrich and Thomas Strenberger. I finished in 18th position i place better than the last comp but I wasn't feeling to happy with my performance.

So I bid all the Germans farewell and headed off by train with the Swiss throwers. I spent time in Zurich with Kim Galeazzi sightseeing and sampling the fine restaurants, I also stayed with Thomas Stehrenberger for a few days in the country.

ROGER PERRY'S EUROPEAN TOUR CONTINUED.

From Switzerland I headed to Dijon and stayed with Didier Bonin for a few days before taking a train to Lacanau for 3 days of demonstrations on the beaches at Lacanau for the World Surfing Championships. Conditions there were windy but the demonstrations went well for the thousands of spectators lining the beach.

After lacanau I stayed with Patrice Castel the designer of the famous French plastic booms and then off to Paris for the filming of a boomerang documentary which is to be shown worldwide later in the year. The documentary although tiring was good practice for the forthcoming french Championships so i decided to arrive early to get used to the conditions and make finally some Paxolin boomerangs.

The French Championships were held in Lille a short train trip from Paris, throwers from most parts of Europe were there and 80 competitors took part. The first event was Aussie Round and I had 57 which i thought was OK until the scoreboard showed me in 20th position flashes from the previous competitions came back to me. In the end I improved with the use of my new booms and I had a great struggle with Oliver Vouktchevitch with the lead changing 4 times before I won the overall on the last event of the day.

The trip was fantastic and the people all over Europe were very friendly, the standard of competitors and the depth took me by surprise and there is no doubt that it will take a very good team to beat the French and Germans.

My thanks to everyone there that made my stay a memorable experience that I will never forget.

I am unsure as to whom I should be writing this letter as it pertains mainly to the V. B. T. A. but as it has possible relevance to the B. A. A. I will leave it to you to decide where it is discussed.

I would like to suggest that for future competitions, instead of trophies being given to the winners of events, that certificates be awarded to the first three place getters in each event.

My reasons for suggesting this is that it would be a much cheaper alternative but no less meaningful to the recipient. As an Association we are very small in number with a very limited income and it would appear that a lot of the money that is paid as entry fees to competitions goes on trophies. Certificates would be much cheaper and if entry fees are continued at the same level the Association would have extra income for promotion etc.

I am sure somebody like Mark Howarth could design a tasteful certificate incorporating the Association logo and print them in quantity at a reasonable cost. The certificates could be prepared in advance of the competition and the name, time, score etc., be written in on the day.

In the past various people have been approached for sponsorship and have given items from their shops or businesses and in many cases they have been unsuitable for engraving or recording any information about the event and in time they become somewhat meaningless.

In the case of State Titles I would suggest that certificates be awarded as well as any trophies.

I would be grateful if these suggestions could be discussed at your next meeting.
