AUSTRALIAN BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS

CUP UPDATE

CUP 1988 WILL HAPPEN :-

The Australian Bicentennial Authority met with us to confirm their support of our event and to their desire that the CUP be staged in Central Australia. The Authority indicated that an increase in sponsorship is very likely and that there are companies still looking to sponsor major sporting events.

Our public relations consultant has forwarded a prospectus to several of these companies. This latest effort is our final thrust to encourage the private sponsorship required to stage the event in association with the Australian Bicentennial Authority.

Team bookings have been forwarded to me from West Germany and Switzerland. I have had direct phone confirmation from USA - Chet Snoufer that a team will be confirmed soon. I have also had second hand information that a French team will be coming. I am anxious to hear of team confirmations from; The British Boomerang Society, The Algemene Boemerang Organisatie of Holland and the Japan Boomerang Association.

A south-eastern coastline Test series has been considered by the BAAInc. as an alternative if sponsorship cannot be raised for the Central Australian location. Fifty-five percent of CUP sponsorship is now available. If the remainder cannot be raised our fallback location will possibly be to hold the three CUP matches at Barooga NSW where the local sports club and Berrigan Shire have promised considerable financial support along with other local business backing.

I hope to confirm final acceptances by the end of November 1987 to arrange what I consider the most unique boomerang throwing event to be staged.

SYNDAL CHAMPIONSHIPS '87

AS USUAL THE WEATHER WAS PERFECT IN THE EARLY MORNING AND RAINING BY THE START OF THE FIRST EVENT.

6 THROWERS FRONTED UP FOR THE DAYS COMPETITION AND DENNIS MAXWELL SHOWED GREAT CONSISTANCY IN THE ACCURACY EVENT TO WIN WITH 22 POINTS USING HIS "MOZZIE" RANG. AFTER A THROWOFF FOR SECOND PLACE, GEOFF TOOK SECOND HONOURS AND MARK CAME THIRD.

FAST CATCH: GEOFF KENNEDY CASUALLY REELED OFF FIVE THROWS TO POST 27.52 sec.(UNOFFICIAL VIC.RECORD) WITH A CRACKED TED BAILEY FAST CATCH RANG FOR FIRST. ROB ONCE AGAIN DROPPED A CATCH AND TOOK OUT SECOND, CLOSELY FOOLLOVED BY DENNIS IN THIRD.

M.T.A.(100): THIS WAS REAL MELBOURNE WEATHER, THE SUN PEEPING THROUGH THE CLOUDS AND THE WIND CALMING DOWN TO ALLOW SOME TOP M.T.A. THROWING TO TAKE PLACE. JOHN GIBNEY TOOK ALL FIVE CATCHES AND BROKE THE 20 SECOND BARRIER. DENNIS ALMOST SCORED THIRD PLACE BUT MARK SCHAFFER PIPPED HIM BY 5/100ths OF A SEC. THEN ON A THROW THAT LOOKED AWFUL AFTER GEOFF SLIPPED ON THE LAUNCH, IT PULLED OUT INTO A THERMAL AND CLOCKED 32.73sec FOR SECOND. ROB CROLL REELED OFF SOME MAGNIFICENT THROWS, THREE IN THE THIRTIES AND THE WINNING TIME OF 41.78 sec. (UNOFFICIAL AUST.RECORD)

AUSSIE ROUND: THIS EVENT HAD GEOFF'S NAME WRITTEN ALL OVER IT AFTER THE FIRST ROUND WITH 63 POINTS, ROB ON 49, DENNIS, MARK AND GLEN IN THE THIRTIES AND JOHN UNFORTUNATELY COPPING THE STRONG WINDS. DURING THE SECOND ROUND SHOWERS WERE APPROACHING, THOUGH THEY DIDN'T HIT UNTILL THE FINAL THROWER - GUESS WHO - JOHN AGAIN. GEOFF FINISHED WITH A TOTAL OF 108 FOR FIRST, ROB ON 99 IN SECOND AND MARK ON 80 FOR THIRD.

TRICK CATCHING WAS DEFINITELY TRICKY IN THE WINDS AND THE WINNER WAS ROB TAKING TWO ONE HANDERS AND MARK & GEOFF TIED FOR SECOND WITH ONE ONE HANDED CATCH. GEOFF BEAT MARK IN THE THROW OFF FOR THE SECOND TIME IN ONE DAY.

WITH 2 FIRSTS AND 3 SECONDS FROM 5 EVENTS, GEOFF WRAPPED UP THE OVERALL AND ALMOST NEEDED A TRAILER TO TAKE HOME HIS TROPHIES.

1987 ALBURY CHAMPIONSHIPS

THOSE OUT ON THE FIELD THE DAY BEFORE THE COMPETITION IT WAS AN OPPORTUNITY TO EXPERIENCE THE BEST BOOMERANG THROWING WEATHER THAT ALBURY HAS TO OFFER. M.T.A.'s AND FAST CATCH RANGS WERE THE ORDER OF THE DAY AND BROTHER THOMAS LAUNCHED ONE FOR ALMOST A MINUTE.

ROB CROLL HAD HIS FAST CATCH RANG ZIPPING AROUND AND DECIDED TO HAVE A GO AT "SUPERCATCH". ON HIS FIRST ATTEMPT HE ONLY MADE FOUR CATCHES, HOWEVER ON THE VERY NEXT TRY, POPPED UP A GOOD M.T.A. FLIGHT AND ON COMPLETING FIVE FAST CATCHES TURNED TO SEE HIS M.T.A. HOVERING STABLY SOME 50 TO 60 FEET UP ONLY 30 FEET DOWN WIND. HE ZIPPED No.6 AROUND, CHECKED AGAIN, TOOK No.7 AND DECIDED HE MIGHT BE CUTTING IT A BIT FINE AND CASUALLY RAN OVER TO TAKE AN EASY M.T.A. CATCH. THE M.T.A. WAS ONE OF ROD JONES' AND WAS UP FOR 49 SEC.

ON THE DAY OF THE COMP, SUNDAY, THE MORNING WAS TERRIFIC AND WE ALL ANTICIPATED SOME VERY HIGH SCORES FOR THE DAY, THIS WAS NOT TO BE. JUST BEFORE THE ACCURACY EVENT THE WIND BEGAN TO INCREASE AND EVERYONE WENT RUNNING TO THEIR BAGS TO CHANGE RANGS.

JOAN BYHAM AND BRETT DOYLE TOOK EARLY LEADS BUT WERE OVERTAKEN BY SOME GREAT WIND THROWING BY PHIL ASHFORD, DENNIS MAXWELL AND BRUCE CARTER. IN THE RUN HOME ROB CROLL EDGED OUT BRUCE ON THE FINAL THROW AND TOOK OUT FIRST PLACE.

FAST CATCH SAW THE WIND MODERATE SLIGHTLY AND BROTHER THOMAS THREW A SCORCHER TIME OF 28.72 sec. FOLLOWED BY PETER JONSON ON 34.65 AND ROB ON THIRD WITH 37.54. ALL THROWERS MADE FIVE CATCHES.

M.T.A. WAS QUITE WINDY AND A LOT OF THROWS TRAVELLED OUTSIDE THE 50 METRE RADIUS CIRCLE. JOHN GIBNEY MISSED ONE CATCH AT AROUND 43 SECONDS AND PETER JONSON OVER 30 SEC. BEFORE IT WANDERED OUTSIDE THE CIRCLE. BROTHER THOMAS HAD HIS RANG RIDING THE WIND WELL AND TOOK THE WINNING CATCH JUST INSIDE THE CIRCLE AT A TIME OF 30.25 SEC. AND ROB CROLL WAS AS EQUALLY CLOSE TO THE LINE WITH A TIME OF 27.51 TO TAKE SECOND. AFTER SEVERAL WIPEOUTS STEVE MORAN CLINCHED THIRD WITH 25.45 SECONDS. DENNIS AND JOHN BOTH TOOK CATCHES OVER 20 SEC. WHICH MADE THE STANDARD OF TIMES VERY HIGH CONSIDERING THE GUSTY WINDS.

AUSSIE ROUND BEGAN WITH A FAIR BREEZE BUT DEVELOPED INTO AN ABSOLUTE GALE BY THE END OF THE FIRST ROUND WITH RAIN PELTING DOWN, RELENTLESSLY SENDING EVERYONE RUNNING FOR COVER. ARTHUR JANETZKI SHOWED HE CAN STILL MIX IT WITH THE BEST WITH SOME GREAT ACCURACY FLIGHTS AND A STUNNING CATCH IN THE FIRST ROUND. THREE THROWERS CLEARED OUT FROM THE PACK IN THE FIRST ROUND, STEVE MORAN, GEOFF KENNEDY AND BRUCE CARTER. IN THE COMMOTION TO LEAVE THE FIELD, 3 THROWERS MISSED OUT ON THROWING AND WITH THE WIND THE WAY IT WAS SOME OF THE THROWERS WERE ALL FOR CALLING IT A DAY. HOWEVER ONCE AN EVENT STARTS IT MUST BE COMPLETED AND IT IS UP TO THE INDIVIDUAL TO DECIDE WHETHER HE/SHE WISHES TO CONTINUE THROWING. A SHOW OF HANDS AND ALMOST HALF THE THROWERS BRAVED THE CONDITIONS TO COMPLETE THE FIRST ROUND AND CONTINUE THE SECOND ROUND. THE WIND TOOK ITS TOLL ON THE EARLY THROWERS THIS TIME WITH BRUCE AND STEVE BOTH POSTING LOW SCORES. THEN IN A BRILLIANT DISPLAY OF DESPERATION, GEOFF TOOK SOME SCREAMER CATCHES INCLUDING A ONE HANDED OVER HIS HEAD THAT WOULD HAVE GONE 50 METRES PAST IF HE HAD MISSED IT. THIS ROUND SEALED THE EVENT FOR GEOFF WITH A TOTAL OF 86.

THOUGH STILL RAINING THE WIND BEGAN TO MODERATE AND SOME FINE SCORES WERE POSTED IN THE SECOND ROUND WITH JARROD BYHAM GETTING 43, ROB CROLL 52 AND BROTHER THOMAS A FANTASTIC 55 .

A VOTE WAS TAKEN AND THE FINAL EVENT OF CONSEC.CATCHING WAS CANCELLED.

THANKS TO KEN OVINGTON FOR SECURING THE SPONSORSHIP AND MARKING OUT THE GROUND, DENNIS MAXWELL FOR HIS ASSISTANCE IN RUNNING THE COMP. AND TO ROB CROLL FOR ORGANISING AND THE SELECTION OF TROPHIES.

About 1972 brother Brian Thomas sold me a 'angaroo' up' boomerang and helped me with throwing. The 'rang had been made by Lorin Hawes of Judgeeraba, Queensland, and a few years later I went there to meet him, only to find that he had sold the property and no longer made boomerangs.

Earlier this year I read in the USA Newsletter that he was back in business at Hope Island, so whilst holidaying on the Gold Coast in July, I drove up to see him. It is a twenty minute trip and most of the time I was wondering if I should be imposing on this man who is a Knight of the Realm and an eminent scholar. I needn't have been concerned, because he gave me the warmest of welcomes.



We threw some boomerangs and had a good yarn about the sport here and overseas. His anecdotes seem endless, and his enthusiasm so infectious, that it was difficult to leave.

The property at Hope Island is still being developed, but already there are two throwing areas, an enclosed verandah to protect spectators, and a billabong, (shaped as a boomerang, of course)! The famous Spring and Black Stump are going in, some unique signs are in place, and a new building has a functional workshop and an attractive sales area.

THROWING MACHINE PRODUCES EVEN TESTS

A throwing machine for boomerangs is useful mainly for scientific purposes, in order to reproduce consistent throws. For manufacturers, it might be a useful testing device as well.

There have been various attempts at making working boomerang launchers since at least 1905. Buckner (1916) built one for indoor use. Spin was produced by using different pressure on parts of the boomerang holder. Felix Hess (1975) explained what a well working b. throwing device should be able to perform. He settled for the old-fashioned manual throwing method for his thesis.

Musgrove is reported to have built a big machine with his students in Reading, England.

Weber (1977) made an interesting suggestion as to how to bring about a motion which forces the b. to whirl around its center of mass: in the end of its forward movement, the sled which holds the b. bounces against a bolt and tips over. But this machine was never built.

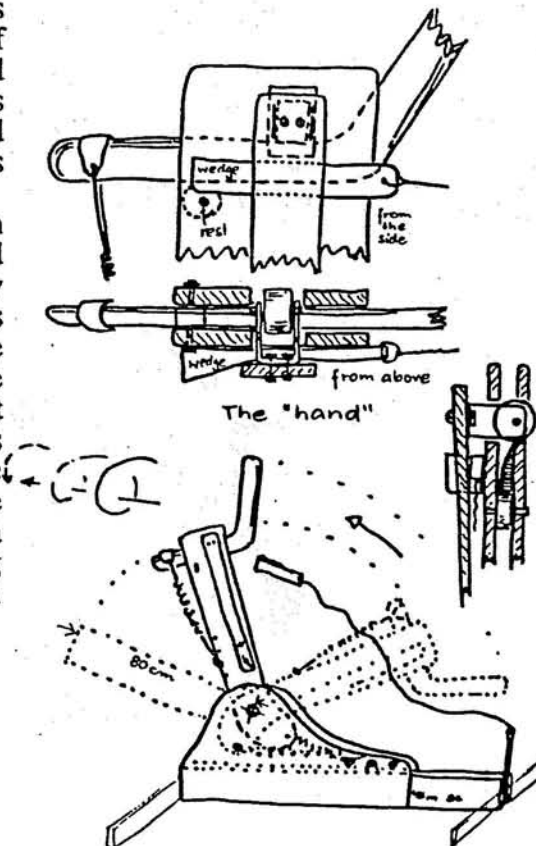
During the German championships, I demonstrated the wooden prototype of my machine. One boomerang arm is kept in a deep groove just as wide as the thickness of the arm. The groove protects the b. with a sheet of leather. The leading edge rests on a round roll. About three inches from that point, a hoof with a wheel on it mounted on a long lever holds the b. A string keeps the other side under tension like a teeter.

So, as soon as the lever is moved sideways, the b. snaps forward, spinning fast. In my prototype, I used a wedge on a string to move the lever sideways.

The nicest commentary of another bloke was "I should introduce you to my wife. For up to this day, she used to think only I was crazy."

But the whole thing worked anyway. I can imagine that somebody who is experienced in working with metal might be able to build a precisely working launcher. I would love to hear of such a talented bloke!

Sydney members are urged to come along whenever possible; it would be a pity if we disappeared without trace at a time when boomerang designs are constantly improving and when there are signs - albeit tentative - that the racism which has held back the sport in Australia may be fading.

One problem we have is that not all members like competitions. And others don't much go for standing around for long periods deciding whose turn it is to throw next. Our people are widely scattered, with lots of demands on their time - not to mention the attractions of the beaches in summer. But the main problem seems to be the lack of a "motivator". Any N.S.W member willing to do some organising would be more than welcome. Perhaps the answer is a mix of sessions, with competitions so informal only the competitive types bother to count

The old informal Sydney spirit is however alive and well. And we are still introducing the occasional newcomer to the sport. At a recent meeting there were two visitors from China - Bow and Yui by name. Both quickly made successful throws, including catches. Bow was particularly adept. When complimented on his prowess, he replied "It's nothing. In China I throw hand grenades 50 metres." Incidentally, Bow took a great liking to the hunting stick. While several of us were sheltering from the rain he went to the middle of the oval, picked up a hunting stick and gave it a heave. It came straight toward us, finally skidding to a stop at our feet over one hundred yards from the thrower. "What did you do that for?" we asked reasonably enough. "Sorry" said Bow. "It went *slightly* off course!"

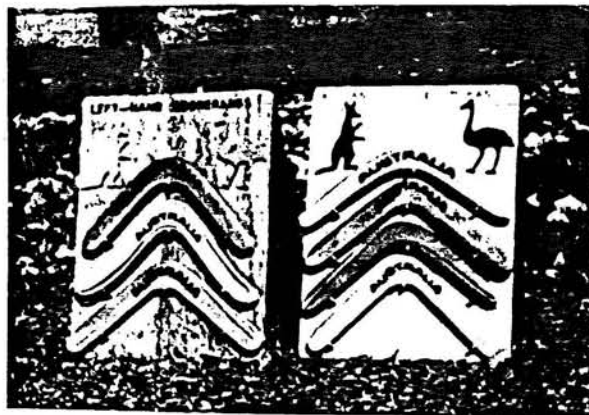
