




1998 World Cup Championships in USA

9th BLUE MOUNTAINS BOOMERANG CHAMPIONSHIPS

Held at "Winbourne", Mulgoa, on Sunday, 9th November 1997.

This was one of those magical days you wait years for..a calm day with a nice cloudy cover overhead! It made it so pleasant for everyone, especially our five newcomers in the Seniors. Two of them are overseas visitors doing courses in English: Roman Slezak from Slovakia, and Masahiro Suzuka from Japan.

Despite the fact that some of our regular throwers chose not to turn up, we still had a magnificent field of 16 Senior throwers and 10 enthusiastic Juniors, plus quite a few keen spectators. We even had the current World Champion himself (Rob Croll) fly up from Melbourne for the occasion. I think he must have been chasing 'brownie points' for the World Ranking list on the Internet. The trip was certainly worthwhile, since Rob performed at his very best for us to win three of the competitions. Having a very strong thrower there does lift the efforts of others and brings them on. Rob did seem to have the Same Boomerang comp wrapped up too, when he posted a marvellous 55 to steal the lead from Gunter Wandtke, but last thrower up, Peter Lewry, showed what could be really done with a Conrad Stacey Ambidexter, when he pounded in a dominating and brilliant 63. The boomerang was just making 30 m for many throwers.

Mention must be made of the great throwing done by our newcomers. Jim Thompson won an Arthur Janetzki medal using a standard Dave Martin rang. Jim's a powerful thrower and should turn in some good MTA times in the future. AJ (Paul Croft in real life) tied with Br. Thomas in Aussie Round on 58 and just lost the throw off. Peter Holmes, just into the Seniors from the Juniors, took out 2nd place in MTA with a great 30.98 secs throw. His throwing of the Ambidexter was also very impressive.

The Juniors was a three way battle between the Pattersons, the Lewrys and the Blue Mountain Boys. It was a case of victory to the Lewrys!! Both girls threw themselves into the record books with their scores. They have recorded the highest scores in Australia by Women Under 18. In the Accuracy Sally slew them with 30 points (she's a leftie, like Peter). Blue Mts Scott Raymond came second with 29, and then followed Sally's sister, Kellie, with 19. Sally also won Nearest the Pin. In Aussie Round the sisters reversed their placings: this time Kellie threw 33 for 1st, Tim Lendrum 20 for 2nd, and Sally 18 for 3rd. This made Kellie Lewry the first winner of the new Perpetual Trophy donated by Springwood Holden. This was presented by the General Manager, Jim Lendrum. They have also donated prizes for the first three places in this event for the next 10 years! A big round of applause and thanks to them for helping to

foster junior boomerang throwing in Australia. Clap, clap, clap, clap, clap, clap!!! The 2 minute Endurance proved a comprehensive victory for the Blue Mountains boys and their coach, Tony Butz. Michael Lendrum dominated with 11 catches in the time (and no drops!), while second place went to his brother, Tim, with 7 catches, and third to Adam Cavill with 5 catches. Well done, boys! The hopes of Australian throwing rests with people like you. Stick at it and you could be throwing in the World Cup in the near future.

Thanks again to the *Christian Brothers* at Mulgoa for the use of their very beautiful property. Throwers love going there just for the setting. Thanks also to *Peter Lewry* who spent many hours and money in developing a great marking machine. Life should get easier for us now! Thanks also to *Ray Bottrell* for his donation towards the engravings.

At this competition all Seniors received a classy grey T-shirt with *The Sport of Boomerangs* on the left pocket area. It is hoped they will wear these around to promote the idea of the sport.

I do hope everyone available makes a big effort to be at the 10th Championships on November 15th ,1998,.... keep it free!!

A NIGHT AT THE CIRCUS

WITHOUT THE MARX BROS!

On January 22nd I attended my first circus in 50 years, when some of us went to see the Sunrise Circus in Forster. This is a small group of six performing adults and two children. The only animal used is a horse ridden by one of the performers.

It is a circus built on human skill. Mark Williams, one of the team, does a one hand hand-stand and then proceeds to play "Hello Dolly" on his trumpet with the other hand, while he is upside down! He is also able to do marvellous juggling acts. One is juggling table tennis balls with his mouth. He shoots them twenty feet in the air catching them in his mouth and spitting them upwards again.

The second act of the night was a clown, who charged into the arena and proceeded to throw a boomerang around the tent (being a small big-top he also had to throw it around a few of the supporting poles). He then threw two boomerangs and caught both (these were v-shaped rangs). Then he threw three cross-bladers after each other and caught all three. Finally he threw a couple of rangs, caught the first and then caught the last (a six-blader) on his hat rim...quite impressive.

At half-time I was able to track down the performing clown and have a talk to him. He is Gary Brophy, who was taught to throw six years ago by Roger Perry. His boomerang designs are from Roger. His boomerangs are made of three-ply, and he told me he has broken a few on the poles. The size of the bigtop they use depends on the area available to them. This was the small one. He says that in the big one throwing is much easier and he can do five consecutive cross-bladers with catches. Gary mentioned that catching the boomerangs in hother goose and grime.

I did ask if I could see his rangs, but professional care didn't allow it. He had shown them to a young chap once and he proceeded to set himself up in the same game, so Gary is being very careful now.

The Circus, although small, is very professional, and is now off doing a tour of Japan. I hope some of our Japanese throwers get to see him. They are a great advertisement for Australia. If they ever come your way, make sure you go and see them.






